



# MGUS (Monoclonal Gammopathy of Uncertain Significance): how we follow you up

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### Introduction

You have recently been told that you have a condition called MGUS. We recommend that you have regular blood tests in order to look for signs that your MGUS may be developing into a more serious condition such as myeloma. Your consultant will decide how often you need these blood tests and if it is appropriate to move you into our remote monitoring clinic. This clinic uses a computer programme called "DAWN" to ensure that your blood results are reviewed by your healthcare team.

## How we follow you up

You will need to have blood tests every six or twelve months. We will write to you with the results and the date of your next appointment. We will send you forms for your next blood tests. You will need to arrange to have these blood tests at your GP surgery about two weeks before your appointment. If we are concerned about the blood test results we will arrange an appointment in the clinic and one of the doctors or specialist nurses will telephone you or see you in person.

## Getting your blood tests done

If you lose or do not receive your blood test forms please contact the DAWN clinic co-ordinator and they can arrange to send a further set. If you are unable to have your blood tests done around the requested date, please let us know and we can arrange a more suitable date. If you think that your appointment has been missed please contact the clinic co-ordinator so that we can look into it.

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## **New symptoms**

If your blood tests remain stable, it is very unlikely that you would develop any symptoms or problems related to your MGUS. If you have any new symptoms, such as those listed below, please contact your GP.

- extreme tiredness
- feeling short of breath
- recurrent infections
- bone pain affecting your back, ribs, arms or legs
- nausea and/or vomiting
- confusion
- unexplained weight loss
- night sweats
- new lumps or swelling, particularly in your neck, armpit or groin
- recurrent infections
- numbness of the hands or feet
- abnormal bleeding

A very small number of people with MGUS will develop problems with vision. Please see an optician if you have any vision changes. They can then refer you to the ophthalmology (eye) department for further tests if they are worried that the changes are related to your MGUS.
