Information for Patients and Carers

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Introduction

This leaflet contains important information about how your child must get ready for the test. It has been designed for you and your child to read together. It is important that your child knows what to expect when they come for the test so that it can be completed quickly and easily.



Important information for parents and carers

Before the appointment:

- If your child has diabetes please contact the Radiology Department for further advice
 on 0116 258 6898. If your child has diabetes they should have been given an early
 morning appointment. If this has not happened it may be that we do not know that your
 child is diabetic. You may also contact your child's normal diabetes care provider to
 discuss the eating and drinking instructions in this leaflet.
- If you need an interpreter, or if you have any special requirements, please contact the Radiology Department for further information.
- Medication should be taken as usual unless you have been told otherwise by the doctor.
- Other children will **not** be allowed in the X-ray room whilst this test is being done. If you
 have other children please make child care arrangements for them and do not bring
 them into hospital if possible.
- Follow the instructions in this leaflet on how your child must get ready for the test.
- **Getting to the hospital:** Transport has not been arranged for this appointment. If transport is needed please contact either your GP or the Radiology Department.

What is a Barium meal or swallow test?

This X-ray is done to look at what happens to food when your child eats. We can do this by giving them a milkshake flavoured drink that will show up when we take X-ray pictures of their tummy.

How should my child get ready for the barium meal or swallow test?

Please go through this leaflet with your child if you want to.



Eating and drinking instructions:

Your child must not have any food or drink for 6 hours before their appointment. It is important that your child's tummy is empty when they have this X-ray test. It is ok to have small sips of water if needed to take medication.

Medication should be taken as usual unless you have been told otherwise by the doctor.

What to bring with you:

You can bring some **food and drink** for your child to have after the appointment.

You can bring a **change of clothes** for your child to wear for the X-ray test. This could be a plain T-shirt with no decoration so that it does not show up on X-ray, and spare trousers.

At the appointment:

1 parent or carer may go into the X-ray room with your child when the test takes place. You will not be allowed into the X-ray room if you are pregnant or think you could be.

What are the risks from exposure to radiation in this procedure?

The risk from having X-rays is very small. We are all exposed to natural background radiation every day of our lives. This comes from the sun, the food we eat, and the ground. Each X-ray gives a dose on top of this natural background radiation. The risks of radiation are slightly higher for an unborn child, so for some types of X-rays of the tummy (abdomen) and pelvis we must ask girls aged 10 and over about their periods.

The radiation from the X-rays during this test is equivalent to getting about a few months of natural background radiation.

Any questions or concerns about the use of X-rays can be answered at the time of the appointment. We will take all safeguards to minimize the amount of X-rays your child is exposed to.

Information for Children

What is a Barium meal or swallow test?

This X-ray is done to look at what happens to your food when you eat it. We give you a milkshake flavour drink that will show up when we take X-ray pictures of your tummy.

How do I get ready for my test?



Do not eat or drink for 6 hours before your X-ray test. It is important that your tummy is empty when you have this X-ray. This means you cannot have any breakfast.

If you need to take medicine, you can have small sips of water.

Please bring some food and drink with you for afterwards as you may be guite hungry and thirsty.

What happens when I arrive for my test?

- When you get to the Radiology Department you will be shown to the Children's X-ray Reception.
- You may be asked to change into a hospital gown for the X-ray test. If you bring your own spare clothes you may be able to wear them instead. This could be a plain T-shirt without any decoration so that it does not show up on X-ray, and spare trousers.
- When you are ready you will be taken into the X-ray room. 1 parent or carer can come in.

What happens in the X-ray room?

- In the room you will be told what is going to happen during your X-ray. You can ask any questions that you may have.
- You will need to lie on the X-ray table.
- You will be given a milkshake flavoured drink called barium. You need to drink this so the inside of your tummy can be seen by our X-ray cameras.
- When you drink the milkshake drink we will take the X-ray pictures.
- You will also be asked to roll onto your side so that we can take X-ray pictures in different positions.

How long will it take?

The X-ray will take between 10 and 20 minutes. The time will vary slightly for each person.

Who will be in the X-ray room?

A doctor who specialises in imaging and X-ray treatments (a radiologist) will do the examination. There will also be a radiographer and there may also be an assistant practitioner and a radiology assistant in the room to help you. As we are a teaching hospital a student may also be in the room. If you wish, you may ask that students are not in the room during your examination.

What happens when my X-rays are finished?

After your X-rays you can go home and eat and drink as usual.

The barium drink will go through your tummy and pass out in your poo within a few days. This means your poo may look white or lighter in colour for a few days.

Barium can cause constipation. Drinking plenty of fluids and eating foods high in fibre until the barium leaves your body can help prevent you becoming constipated.

How do I find out what the results are?

The results will not be given to you straight away.

The X-ray pictures will be looked at carefully by the X-ray doctor and they will send the results to the doctor that wanted you to have these X-rays.

Your parents or carers will be told how to get your results.
