How to put the hearing aid in your ear



How to put the hearing aid in:

Hold your earmould by the handle.


Use the right hand for right hearing aid.
Use the left hand for left hearing aid.





Slide the earmould into your ear.





Place the hearing aid on top of your ear.

The earmould should be comfortable and secure.



The earmould should not be sticking out.





How to take the hearing aid out:

Take the hearing aid off the top of your ear.

Then pinch the back of the earmould.

Then pull the earmould backwards.

How to clean the hearing aid and the earmould






Your earmould and the tubing need to be cleaned.

Cleaning makes them sound clearer.




Wipe your earmould everyday with a clean cloth or wet wipe.






Remove the earmould from the hearing aid once a week.



Wash the earmould in a bowl of soapy water.

Rinse through with water from the tap.

Dry with a cloth.




When dry, push the earmould tube back onto the hearing aid.

What to do if your hearing aid is not working

No Sound

Funny sounds





If your hearing aid is not making any noise, or making a strange noise, there are some things you should do.









Change the battery.



Have your doctor check your ears for wax.





Clean the earmould and tube (look at page 3 for how to do this).





Make sure the earmould is in correctly (look at page 2 for how to do this).






If the hearing aid is still not working then contact the Hearing Services Department for a repair appointment.

How to change the earmould tubing





The tube needs to be changed every 6 months.




Pull the hearing aid off the tubing (look at page 3 for how to do this).

Keep the old tubing until you have finished.



Cut a new tube at one end to make a point.



Thread the new tubing through the hole in the earmould.

The tubing point should come out of the end.




Cut off the pointed end of the tube.

How to change the earmould tubing continued



Place an old tube next to the new tube then cut the tubing.





Push the earmould back onto the hearing aid.
