What to expect after your operation

Many people have no problems after this operation. If you have any pain take paracetamol or ibuprofen.

You will need to lay flat at home for 24 hours after surgery. You can get up to eat and drink and use the toilet but no standing up for a long time. Laying flat allows the bubble of air to press the graft onto the cornea.

Your vision can take several months to recover, and it can take up to 6 months before vision is stable. If you had a cataract removed at the same time, you will need an eye test to decide if glasses will be needed for better vision.

Stitches are removed around 6 months after surgery.

If you notice any of the following symptoms you should contact the Ophthalmic Suite or Eye Casualty Department using the contact numbers on the last page:

- Increasing redness
- Increasing swelling
- Sudden loss of vision
- Drop in vision

- Pain not managed with paracetamol
- Yellow sticky discharge
- Increased floaters, shadows and 'veil/ curtains' in your vision.

After surgery you should:

- Wear the eye shield until the morning after your operation.
- Remove the eye shield the morning after your operation.
- Start using the drops the morning after surgery.
- Wash the eye shield daily with hot soap and water, then leave it to dry.
- Wear the eye shield in bed for the next 14 nights. Apply with surgical tape which is available from pharmacies and supermarkets.
- You may have a bandage contact lens in place which will be removed in clinic. It may fall out by itself. If so do not put it back in, wait until your clinic appointment. If you are worried please contact the corneal nurse.
- If you wish, you can wear sunglasses or your normal glasses during the day.
- If your eye is sticky in the mornings, you can bathe it with cooled boiled water and cotton wool.
- It is OK to look and bend down.
- Cooking, watching TV and reading will not cause any harm.
- Continue with any long-term regular eye drops. If you are mot sure, please ask a nurse or doctor.
- Avoid strenuous activity such as gardening and heavy lifting for 2 weeks after surgery.
- Stay off work for 2 weeks. If your job involves being in a dusty environment you may need to stay off for longer.

After surgery you should not:

- Get any tap water in your eye for 1 month. Check with your doctor before going swimming. Only use cool boiled water on the face
- Get soap and water in your eye when washing your face/ hair.
- Drive until you have checked with a doctor, nurse or optician when you are safe to do so.
- Rub or touch your eye.

Follow up

- You will be seen a few days after your operation. You will be told what time and where to attend. You may be told on the ward or by a letter in the post.
- The nurse will have given you some drops with this leaflet. Please follow the verbal and written advice about when to take the drops and how long for.
- If you think you are going to run out of your drops, please contact your GP surgery.

How to apply your eye drops

- Always wash you hands before putting in the drops.
- Sit or lie with your head titled backwards.
- Gently pull the lower lid down with 1 finger.
- Holding the bottle on the bridge of your nose or on your forehead, squeeze 1 drop into the eye.
- Close your eye and gently blot excess drops with a clean tissue.
- If you think you may have missed your eye with the drops, it is safe to put another drops in.
- When putting the eye drops into your eye, do not allow the bottle tip to touch the eye.
- Do not allow other people to use your eye drops.
- Throw away the drops when you have finished the course of treatment.

Your eye drops plan is as follows:

The following drops should be applied to your operated eye only, starting the morning after surgery:

Eye drop	Time	Action
Dexamethasone (preservative-free)	1 drop, every 2 hours for 1 month, reducing dose after this time.	Anti-inflammatory
Chloramphenicol/ levofloxacin (preservative-free)	1 drop, 4 times a day for 2 weeks.	Antibiotic
Cyclopentolate 1%	1 drop, 3 times a day for 2 days.	Dilating drops

1 drop from each cyclopentolate 1% bottle, 3 times per day for 2 days.

You must follow the instructions for your eye drops. If you run out of dexamethasone it can put your graft at risk of rejection which can cause loss of vision if not treated.

If you have any problems getting eye drops from your GP, contact the corneal specialist nurse or secretary. If you know you cannot get the drops from your GP, please contact us in plenty of time so we can speak to your doctor and post a prescription to you, or you may have to come to the hospital for your eye drops.
