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
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#### Information leaflet from infection prevention

The baby's circle of protection

The circle shows the area which is called, 'the baby's circle of protection'. We all can help protect babies from infection when they are still in the neonatal special care baby unit.

Parents have an important role in the care of their babies. This is through good habits that boost bonding and attachment.

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#### What is 'baby's circle of protection'

The circle is a invisible barrier around individual babies within a safe and clean area. This will help stop infections and protect your baby. Your baby's circle will have proper equipment your baby needs, such as the incubator and the paperwork relating to your baby's care and treatment.

#### What can you as a parent do to help to protect your baby within the baby's circle of protection?

- Take off all outer clothes such as coats and hang in the reception area on the hooks provided before entering the unit.
- Please wash your hands with soap and water as soon as you enter the clinical area. Hand sanitizer will also be available when you enter your baby's circle.
- If you come in contact with your child, kindly roll up your sleeves and remove any clothes that go below the elbows.
- Make sure your visitors wash their hands with soap and water and follow the bare below the elbow rules.
- Please do not be afraid to challenge any member of staff on cleaning their hands.
- Skin to skin contact is needed to support attachment and bonding with your baby.
- Please speak to a staff member if you or a family member feels sick, like having diarrhoea and throwing up, a cough or cold, a fever, or chicken pox. They can help you with more details about visiting the unit to protect your baby.













## Why is it so important to protect your baby whilst within 'the baby's circle'?

Babies who are born early (premature) or need to be admitted to a newborn (neonatal) unit due to illness may be more at risk of infection.

Hand hygiene (cleaning your hands) before entering 'the baby's circle' is key to protect your baby. Cleaning hands is the most effective way to prevent infection.

On admission to the neonatal unit, babies will have swabs taken to find any unknown infections. These swabs are repeated once a week while in the unit.

As parents, you will be getting regular reports from the medical and nursing staff on each step of your "baby's care."








Hand hygiene is the single most important factor in preventing infection.
