



Moving your newborn baby to another hospital (CenTre Neonatal Transport)

Information for Parents and Families

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Introduction

Welcome to the CenTre Neonatal Transport Service. This leaflet tells you about who we are and how we will safely move your baby. We understand that this is a stressful time for you and you may feel scared. These feelings are common. The transport team will be able to answer any questions that you may have, so please ask them if you are not sure about anything.

Who are the CenTre Neonatal Transport Service?

CenTre Neonatal Transport Service is a team of highly skilled doctors and nurses who have lots of experience in transferring sick and premature babies. These babies may need specialist or continuing care in another hospital or they may be returning to a hospital closer to their family home for ongoing care.

We provide transport services for hospitals across the East Midlands region.

The transport team will introduce themselves to you when they arrive. They will then work with the team from your neonatal unit to make sure that your baby is as stable as possible before they are transferred. This can often be a very busy time for the team but they will keep you informed of what is happening.





Our specialist transport equipment

This is a picture of our transport trolley which your baby will travel in.

Will my baby be safe during the transfer?

We will continue to provide all of the specialist care that your baby needs during the journey.

Your baby will be secured in a soft harness in our transport incubator. The incubator allows us to keep your baby warm. Our specialist equipment allows us to monitor their heart rate, temperature, breathing rate and blood oxygen levels. We are able to give any fluids or medicines that your baby may need using our infusion pumps. We can also help your baby with any breathing problems they may have.

Will I be able to travel with my baby?

It may be possible, if you are well enough, for one parent to travel with us in the ambulance. The transport team will talk to you about this, but please ask them if they don't mention it. You must be fit and well and discharged from postnatal care. You should also be able to get in and out of the ambulance by yourself.

If you suffer from motion sickness it may be advisable for you not to travel in the ambulance. If you do travel with your baby you will be expected to stay in your seat with your seat belt fastened unless told otherwise by a member of our team.

If you are not able to travel with your baby please do not try to follow our ambulance. Please do make sure that you travel at a safe and steady speed. Our team will give you information about the hospital your baby is being taken to.

What if I have any concerns about my baby's transfer?

The transport team will be with your baby throughout the journey in the ambulance. We will be observing and monitoring your baby for any changes in their condition throughout the journey. We will also make regular notes on your baby's condition during the journey which we will share with the team in the hospital your baby is being taken to.

If you have any concerns please speak to one of the transport team before they leave in the ambulance.

This is **Miles**, he is our transport service teddy bear. Every baby we transfer is given their very own Miles to keep and take home.

Miles is a very well travelled little bear, as you can imagine, as we regularly complete over 140 transfers every month.
